The Future

From our joint Session Clerk, Ben Bond:

As you will be aware, the Mission Plan of our Presbytery (the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian) passed in late 2022 placed our church in a new grouping of churches to the north of our Parish, known as Mission District North.

We objected to this for a number of reasons, and submitted a Request for Review of the decision in June this year. A Review Panel was appointed in September and has reviewed our request over recent months.

We have now learned that our Request for Review has been rejected and so the Presbytery's decision is upheld.

Notwithstanding the Review Panel's decision, as your Kirk Session we remain committed to retaining Stockbridge Parish Church in Saxe-Coburg Street as a centre for congregational Worship and Community Service, and the Kirk Session will engage with the Congregation as early as possible in the New Year to discuss how to achieve this.



Obituary Rev Jim (James Lindsay) Wilkie, 1934 - 2024

Jim read Classics at Aberdeen University, 1952-1956. He was a committed Christian and an active member of the University's Student Christian Movement (SCM) where he met Dr Irene Wilkie (née Watson). Jim graduated in 1956 with a First and commenced a Divinity Course at Christ College, Aberdeen. After graduating from Christ College in 1959, he was ordained as a minister of the Church of Scotland. He and Irene were now married, and they spent the next 16 years (1960 - 1976) in Zambia in a variety of church based and medical roles, in Jim's case latterly as Protestant Chaplin for the University of Zambia. In 1976 Jim and family returned to the UK where he spent 8 years working for the British Council of Churches in London, latterly as the Secretary of Conference for World Mission. He and Irene returned to Scotland in 1984 to the role of Overseas African Secretary for the Church of Scotland, based in Edinburgh. Jim retired in 1994 though continued to be active in a variety of capacities and organisations including Stockbridge Parish Church, the Iona Community and Fresh Start, an Edinburgh rehousing charity.

Jim is survived by his wife, Dr Irene Wilkie, and his four children, James, Anne, Margaret and Catherine.

In conversation with Claire Montgomery the Fundraising and Communications manager and the CEO Sarah Van Putten, I re-discovered a place I knew well but which had been further improved. It also boasts a great lunch club where I was treated to a baked potato with Scott and Margaret Bennet for company.

Claire tells me that there are four things I can pass on to you as members of Stockbridge Church.

- 1. Places are available currently within the Dean Club for 50+ who are frail and elderly.
- 2. There are free activities on offer for 'unpaid' carers.
- 3. The 'Chatty Café' is open on Mondays between 11am and 1pm for anyone who would like a chat.
- 4. On Saturdays there is the Saturday Social Club which offers free food, warmth and companionship.

And, of course volunteers are always welcome.



Good news stories:

At the start of a new year, you may, like me, have felt a gloom at the never-ending stories of wars, natural disasters, and many crises brought about by humankind. To counter these feelings of trepidation, I offer you some hopeful facts:-

- For a new born child at the start of the 20th century life expectancy globally was 32 years. Today, it has more than doubled to over 70 years.
- Child mortality rates are dropping sharply. Globally, in a single generation, the number of children dying under the age of 5 has fallen by 59%.
- Maternal deaths dropped by more than a third world-wide during the first two decades of the 21st century.
- In 1950, half the global population had no formal education. In 2020, that figure had been reduced to 13.7%. Globally, there are 50 million more girls in school today than there were in 2015.
- The global Covid-19 vaccination programme is the fastest the world has ever seen.
- Unicef has signed a long-term agreement with the world's biggest vaccine manufacturer to supply the new malaria vaccine through to 2028.
- Deforestation across the 9 Amazonian countries is down over 58% on the same period a year ago.
- China's time as the world's biggest polluter may soon be over, as 2023 has been a record-breaking year for installing low-carbon energy infrastructure.
- The hole in the ozone layer is on track to be healed over most of the world by 2040.
- The demilitarised zone between North and South Korea is now an unlikely wildlife sanctuary. It is now home to 6200 species, including 38% of the endangered birds and animals on the Korean Peninsula, such as golden eagles.

News from the Kirk

The Life and Death of Eric Liddell and the Rebirth of Chinese Christianity.





Eric Liddell is best-known for his athletic achievements, particularly his gold medal in the 400 metres at the Paris Olympics in 1924. In association with the Eric Liddell Community's celebration of the centenary of that victory, this event will focus on the other aspect of his life, which was perhaps even more important to him, namely his life and work as a Christian missionary and teacher in China.

In this half-day programme, three scholars of the University of Edinburgh will focus on Liddell's life and work in China, his legacy there, and the subsequent history of Chinese Christianity, worldwide and in China itself.

In the centenary of Eric Liddell's Olympic gold medal, this free event will focus on his religious life and work in China and its legacy. Saturday, 3 February 2024 10:00–12:30 The Playfair Library, Old College, University of Edinburgh. Register for a place through Eventbrite.
