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Letter from our Locum Minister, Rev John Munro

Many people still enjoy a good Christmas. The Christmas tree, the Christmas dinner, the singing of carols and even, some, the message of a saviour's birth. It's a time of great joy for all the people even if it is in the middle of a northern winter! Easter by comparison is something that these days many people shy away from. The good old days when children used to roll their hard-boiled eggs down a hill, symbolic of the story in the gospels about the stone that covered Christ's tomb being rolled away, is being replaced in the secular society by the gifts of chocolate eggs not to mention the ubiquitous Easter bunny.

Of the two, Easter is the more important Church festival with its story of a crucified Christ and his subsequent powerful resurrection from the dead. One can understand the significance of the crucifixion in terms of his self-sacrifice, that 'greater love for his friends' talked about in John's gospel; but what are we to make of the idea of bodily resurrection?

'Resurrection', the idea that people in general and Jesus in particular, 'rise physically from the dead' is not something that the 'man of science' would want to take literally in the 21st century. And yet, the whole business of Christ's resurrection from the dead is something that is so central to any celebration of Easter it simply cannot be ignored or played down by those who think they may know better.

The stories in the gospels that tell of his rising from the dead give the impression of an incredible transformation having taken place in those who were numbered among Christ's followers and friends. Something happened very soon after his death on the cross that changed his followers for ever-from being frightened stragglers, the beaten remnants of a failed revolt, into a fearless body of men and women who were determined to tell his story and their story to the ends of the earth if need be. Popular preachers talked about this transformation as "thirty-six hours that changed the world," and with this I couldn't disagree. What happened was that all their fears had turned to freedom, past mistakes were forgiven (but not forgotten), and they lived no longer for themselves but for others, even as Christ had done.

Such is the quality of the new life we enjoy 'in Christ' here and now, that we are encouraged to believe that such a life, in a word, must be 'eternal' - a quality of life that some have described as 'resurrection now' rather than 'pie in the sky when you die'.

"Let us give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Because of his great mercy he gave us new life by raising Jesus from death. This fills us with a living hope..." (1 Peter 1.3)

I hope you will be able to join us in person this Easter for the various services advertised in this edition of 'The Bridge'. If not, then our Easter Sunday service will be broadcast live at the usual time of 11am.

Fiona McN reports from the Christian Aid online gathering on 27th February.

Val Brown, the interim head of Christian Aid chaired the Gathering.

This year's main focus for Christian Aid are Ukraine and Burundi.

The Ukrainian people living there want to live as normally as possible. To facilitate this Christian Aid are providing micro grants to help local communities come back to life and regain their dignity. People from the local community are supported in their application for a grant. Form filling to apply for the grant is made simple and those applying are supported and advised in their application. They will write the proposal and budget and then implement the outcome. Micro grants provide funding for a multitude of needs. Greenhouses, small livestock, generators, communal washing machines, playgrounds and support for disadvantaged groups. It is the local communities who decide what they need.

Burundi lies to the south of Rwanda in East Africa with a population of approximately 12.55 million. It is described as the second poorest country in the world with 75% of the population living in poverty.

Three main areas are being addressed with the assistance of Christian Aid.

- Climate adaptation and resilience
- Gender justice
- Peace building and resolution.

Ngozi a town in Burundi has been supported by Christian Aid since 2016. 21 women who have been helped by micros grants now run their own businesses and provide loans to other women. They have been able to buy land, grow and sell their crops. Pay for their children's education. Afford to buy medical insurance for themselves. They have been so successful that they have been able to form two new groups.

Christian Aid believes in life before death and a vision to end poverty.

The annual booksale for Christian Aid is again being held by St Andrews and St George's West church, on Saturday May 11th, then Mon 13th onwards for the rest of the week. For sale this year: books, antiques and collectables, pictures, stamps and postcards, sheet music and toys. Since it started in 1973 the sale has raised over £2m for Christian Aid's work to end poverty.



Saturday 30th March, 2pm, West Princes Street Gardens. Free and unticketed.





Scottish Parliament recognises 'iconic' St Giles' as the congregation celebrates 900 years

A motion has been laid in the Scottish Parliament recognising St Giles' Cathedral

as "a prominent part of the life of Edinburgh and Scotland for 900 years".

It commends the "iconic" cathedral, which was probably founded by King David I in 1124, for "its various projects, designed to reach out to people of all ages, backgrounds and faiths across the city".



The citation continues stating that "1.5 million people from around the world visited St Giles' in 2023, underlining its status as a dynamic centre celebrating Scotland's heritage and culture, as well as being an active place of worship".

Rev Dr George Whyte, the interim moderator of St Giles', said:

"We very much appreciate the recognition given by the Scottish Parliament and we remain committed to continued service in the years ahead."

Pat B wishes to share with us her report from the pastor Munther Isaac's talk at a vigil for Gaza at Bloomsbury Baptist Church in London:

Christ Under the Rubble: Gaza and us

Inspired by the late Dr Runa Mackay, my interest in Palestine is longstanding. It is not just a concern for me or the others who have visited the Holy Land or raised funds for Medical Aid for Palestinians. It is a concern for all people of humanity that the progressive, ongoing destruction and occupation of Palestinian land, the exile and suffering of so many over 76 years have been unjustifiable and must end. It has also been to powerful governments a concern that they seem to think can put aside. Why?

The pastor of the Christmas (Lutheran) Church in Bethlehem, the Rev. Dr. Munther Isaac, preached on December 23rd, 2023, in Bethlehem with the image of Jesus born not in a sweetly hay-lined manger but under rubble as a symbol of where Christ is to be found, with the oppressed and 'sore wounded'. However, that does not mean we can and should leave Him there.

The Rev. Munther spoke last weekend (17th and 18th February) both at the Saturday demonstration in London and on Sunday in Bloomsbury Baptist Church thanks to the Christian organisations Embrace the Middle East and Sabeel-Kairos UK.

On Sunday the talk was headed by the verse from Isaiah 58:6, '...is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen, to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke?'

The pastor pointed out, passionately, that while organisations, churches, governments 'debate and deliberate', they are unable to get humanitarian aid into Gaza, make the excuse for the suffering of Palestinians a matter of 'self-defence' for Israel (what about self-defence for Palestinians?), and dehumanise the victims, who are not seen as equal.

It is Lent and we were asked to reflect on three things: the need for repentance, for piety and for suffering.

Repentance: for the racism and apartheid contributing to the silence from some churches as well as institutions of government.

Piety: to build and act upon a hunger for justice and a compassion which goes beyond charity, the latter being potentially a cover for non-action.

Courage - part of piety - is in taking sides: neutrality is not an option and allows truth to be hidden.

Suffering: it was pointed out that we claim to follow a crucified Christ, a Christ on the Cross where God IS. Solidarity with the suffering is costly and takes the courage to speak truth rather than avoid controversy.

Pastor Isaac reminded us of the SUMUD, or resilience, of the Palestinian people, with the hope that the world will rally to restore a truly Holy Land.

This, I believe, is a challenge to us all.

As the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton, recently wrote:

If you pray, pray from your guts, not your lips – offer a prayer that moves in you and through you – one that calls you to reach out to a fearful neighbour, to speak up for peace and calm and the unity of humanity. Pray for all those many people injured and those mourning the loss of loved ones and those living in abject fear who await news of family members missing.

Wherever you are, check in on your Jewish neighbours, friends and colleagues.

Wherever you are, check in on your neighbours, friends and colleagues who have family in Gaza.

Wherever you are, be mindful of your words. Tarring with a broad brush adds more fuel to the fire, so be kind to one another wherever you find each other.

The Zulu phrase, Ubuntu, is the theme for my year as Moderator and its challenging truth resonates powerfully today. 'I am because you are.' We are one global family. When we look into the face of another human being, God looks out from the windows of their souls. Today, love God by loving each other.

A further prayer from the Moderator - A prayer for peace

"In days to come ... they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war anymore."

God, it is said that you are the peace that passes all understanding. We sit now, staggered at how quickly the fragile half-peace we had pieced together has unravelled.

The lessons we have so desperately needed to learn have been laid aside as the instruments of war begin their horrible, haunting reprise. Call us back to our senses.

For the angry, abused and frightened among us, who strike out in a distorted quest for victory, help us find ways to convince that there is no victory to be found in violence.

Peace-making is a daunting path to tread, especially when fear follows so closely behind, so breathe your loving spirit into our hearts and help us walk your way.

We pray ceaselessly for our family in Israel and Palestine, for we are all family and when one part suffers, we are all depleted. Peace in pieces is a collective, shared shame.

God, you are the peace that passes all understanding, so help us understand how to find you.

Amen.
